Introduction


In light of the ongoing Israeli aggression on the Gaza Strip and the West Bank, and as Palestinian people continue their battle for independence, dignity and breaking-free from the longest-ever occupation during which they have drawn the finest displays of bravery and heroism in confronting the Israeli murder machine and aggression. The reality of what happened on Oct. 7, the motives behind it, its general context related to the Palestinian cause, as well as a refutation of the Israeli allegations, and an effort to put the facts into perspective.



The battle of the Palestinian people against occupation and colonialism did not start on Oct. 7, but started 105 years ago, including 30

years of British colonialism and 75 years of Zionist occupation. Over these long decades, the Palestinian people suffered all forms of oppression, injustice, expropriation of their fundamental rights and the apartheid policies. The seven million Palestinians living in extreme conditions in refugee camps and other areas who wish to return to their lands, and who were expelled 75 years ago. Proceeding from the above, Operation Al-Aqsa Flood on Oct. 7 was a necessary step and a normal response to confront all Israeli conspiracies against the Palestinian people and their cause.


It was a defensive act in the frame of getting rid of the Israeli occupation, reclaiming the Palestinian rights and on the way for liberation and independence like all peoples around the world did. According to official figures, in the period between (January 2000 and September 2023), the Israeli occupation killed 11,299 Palestinians and injured 156,768 others, the great majority of them civilians. From Oct 7th, 2023 to 28th Jan, 2024 the death toll increased to 26, 422 and 11,000 of them were children.



There is an urgent need for humanitarian assistance in Gaza, encompassing necessities such as food, shelter, water, and sanitation, particularly for over 1.1 million women and girls. The Gaza Strip is ensnared in a deadly cycle of conflict, malnutrition, and diseases, posing a threat to over 1.1 million children. There is a severe shortage of essential medicines, vaccines, medical supplies, and primary care items, with a deficit exceeding



60%. The infrastructure, healthcare, and services in Rafah are fragile and inadequate to meet the needs of 1.3 million citizens and displaced individuals. The situation in the Gaza Strip is catastrophic, with only 5% of the medical institutions' workforce remaining. Aid remains inaccessible to hundreds of thousands of people in northern Gaza and across the Strip. The war's toll extends beyond immediate challenges, severely impacting Gaza's economy and infrastructure, with more than half of homes destroyed, further deepening the region's long-term struggles.

Summary Distribution Reports Oct 2023 – Jan 2024

The crowdfunding campaign initiated by MyFundAction to support Emergency Relief for Palestine has yielded remarkable results, with a total collection of \$596,078.13. This substantial amount was raised through various channels, including the Waqf Medical Centre, Medicine and Medical Supplies, Hot Meals Distribution, as well as Hygiene Kit and Baby Kit Distribution initiatives. The funds were diligently utilized, with a total expenditure of \$124,216.54, which directly benefited 114,640 Palestinian individuals in Gaza. This significant contribution underscores the generosity and compassion of the global community towards addressing the urgent humanitarian needs in Palestine.

Implementation 1: Hot Meals Distribution

The inaugural distribution on October 10th marked a significant milestone for our relief efforts, as we successfully distributed 8,000 packs of hot meals across key locations in Gaza, including Khan Younis, Beit Hanoun, and Jabalia. The total cost incurred is \$15,750.00. The distribution aimed to address the immediate food needs of vulnerable communities in North Gaza. The team worked diligently to coordinate logistics, ensuring a smooth and efficient process. Beneficiaries in each location received warm, nutritious meals, providing sustenance during these challenging times. The positive feedback from the recipients underscored the impact of our initiative in addressing the pressing needs of the affected populations. As we reflect on this initial distribution, it serves as a foundation for future endeavors and reinforces our commitment to providing essential support to those in need throughout the region.





Implementation 2: Hot Meals Distribution

In our ongoing commitment to addressing the immediate needs of vulnerable communities in Gaza, our second distribution took place on 20th October, 2023 in Jabalia, Al-Maghazi Camp, and Deir al-Balah with the total cost of \$20,000. This operation successfully delivered 10,000 packs of hot meals to residents in these areas, providing crucial sustenance during challenging times. The distribution process was conducted meticulously to ensure equitable access and efficient delivery of warm, nutritious meals to those in need. The positive impact of this initiative was palpable, with recipients expressing gratitude for the support. The second distribution not only builds upon the success of our initial efforts but also reinforces our dedication to making a meaningful difference in the lives of those affected by the ongoing challenges in Gaza. As we move forward, we remain steadfast in our commitment to providing essential support and addressing the evolving needs of the communities we serve.





Implementation 2: OPS Ihsan Distribution of Ready to Eat (RTE) Packs

In our ongoing collaborative efforts with 53 NGOs in Malaysia under "Ops Ihsan," our third distribution, which took place on 3rd November 2023, involved the collective dispatch of 10,000 packs of Ready-To-Eat (RTE) meals to communities in need in Gaza.



distribution This represents а cumulative endeavor that contributes to the broader initiative's success. In total, Ops Ihsan, in collaboration and support with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, has facilitated the dispatch of approximately 100 tons of aid relief to Gaza through three distinct phases of sorties in the form of medicines, medical equipment, food, baby and women's necessities and winter necessities worth RM3 million. This multi-phase approach reflects the concerted efforts of various stakeholders, emphasizing the impact that strategic collaborations can have in addressing the pressing needs of affected populations. As we reflect on our cumulative achievements, we remain committed to sustained collaboration and support for the well-being of those in Gaza.

The goods received by the Egyptian Red Crescent Society will be taken into Gaza through the Rafah border before being handed over to the Palestine Red Crescent Society, which will be responsible for distributing them to hospitals and also to those in need in Gaza.



The third humanitarian aid mission from Malaysia to Gazans under "Ops Ihsan" successfully arrived at the El Arish International Airport in Egypt,

The collective and integrated efforts of the Foreign Ministry, government agencies and over 60 non-governmental organisations (NGOs), coupled with the spirit of Malaysians, proved crucial in the success of Ops Ihsan. Ops Ihsan has proven to be effective through the structured and efficient management and use of resources and expertise of the various organisations involved. This collaboration has managed to prevent overlapping and misappropriation to ensure the aid provided met their requirements and reached those in need.

Implementation 4: Medicine, Medical Supplies Distribution & Hot Meals Distribution

In our fourth distribution effort, we implemented a comprehensive outreach program encompassing the distribution of medicines, medical supplies, and hot meals at Shuhada Al-Aqsa School and Malaysia School, located in the heart of Gaza. The combined value of these essential provisions amounted to \$9,737.28. This distribution aimed to address critical healthcare needs and provide nourishment to the community, particularly in areas where access to such resources may be limited.





The strategic locations of Shuhada Al-Aqsa School and Malaysia School enabled us to target a wide demographic, ensuring that the impact of our humanitarian efforts reached those in need, especially those taking shelter in the schools. This distribution represents our ongoing commitment to enhancing the well-being of communities in Gaza, addressing both immediate medical requirements and nutritional needs in a holistic manner.





Implementation 5: Medicine & Medical Supplies Distribution

In our fifth distribution endeavor, we focused on the critical sector of healthcare. specifically directing our efforts towards Al-Aqsa Martyr Hospital. This distribution involved the provision of medicines and medical supplies with a total value of \$20,000. Our aim was to bolster the medical capabilities of the hospital, ensuring that it is well-equipped to meet the healthcare needs of the community it serves. This strategic allocation of resources reflects our commitment to strengthening healthcare infrastructure in Gaza, particularly at a crucial institution like Al-Aqsa Martyr Hospital. Through these ongoing distributions, we strive to contribute meaningfully to the well-being of the local population by addressing immediate medical requirements and fortifying essential healthcare facilities.





Implementation 6: Phase 1 Psychological Supports for Gazan Kids

In our sixth distribution initiative, we initiated Phase 1 of a psychological support program designed specifically for the well-being of Gazan children. This phase targeted 1,000 children in two shelters located in Beit Al-Maqdis and Abdul Qader Al Husseini Camp in Khan Younes, Gaza.

The program aims to provide essential psychological support to help alleviate the emotional impact of the ongoing challenges faced by the children. Through interactive activities, gift distributions and a safe space for expression, our objective is to contribute positively to the mental health and resilience of these children. This distribution represents a crucial aspect of our holistic approach to addressing the multifaceted needs of the community in Gaza, particularly focusing on the mental well-being of its youngest members





Implementation 7: Hot Meals Distribution For 13 Days Consecutively

In our seventh distribution initiative, we undertook the noteworthy endeavor of providing hot meals for thirteen consecutive days to residents in Deir al-Balah, Khan Younis, Nusairat Camp, Bureij Camp, and Al-Maghazi Camp, benefiting a total of 72,500 Palestinians. The total cost of this extensive effort amounted to \$17,000. During the implementation, a compelling incident was reported to our project manager in Malaysia by our implementor. The story highlighted a remarkable event where, by the grace of Allah, the usual quantity of food prepared for 5,000 people unexpectedly proved sufficient for over 7,000 individuals.

Typically, our partner distributes meals to one camp, but on this particular day, the distribution had to be extended to three camps to utilize the surplus food. This incident illustrates the blessings and abundance from Allah, reinforcing the impact of our support in alleviating hunger among our Muslim brothers and sisters in Gaza. It serves as a testament to the significance of our efforts in providing essential sustenance during challenging times.

Through targeted counseling sessions, interactive activities, and a nurturing environment, we strive to further contribute to the mental well-being and resilience of children. This ongoing effort these underscores our commitment to addressing the unique needs of Gazan youth, recognizing the importance of psychological support in their holistic development amidst challenging circumstances.

Sustainable Project 1: Timeline "A Better Life for Palestine" Project Justification:

MyFundAction proposed sustainable project aims to send emergency relief to Gaza on a quarterly basis, spanning from January 2024 to January 2025, in collaboration with various stakeholders. The total cost of the project amounts to \$426,408.92, targeting the provision of essential aid to alleviate the dire humanitarian situation in Gaza. The initiative involves sending approximately 15,000 ready-to-eat (RTE) packed food, including beef stew, and basmathi rice, along with 2,000 hygiene kits for women and men, baby kits, and medicine kits. The packed RTE food can last for up to two years, offering convenience to the people of Palestine who do not have access to cooking facilities. This aspect is particularly advantageous given the challenging circumstances faced by many in the region. The relief aid will then be sent to Gaza from Malaysia.

This collaborative effort is facilitated by a coalition comprising OPS Ihsan, the Foreign Affairs Ministry of Malaysia, the Red Crescent Egypt, and the Egyptian Embassy. The distribution of relief aid is scheduled to occur in January, May, September 2024, and January 2025, ensuring a consistent and timely provision of assistance to those in need. The rationale behind this initiative stems from the high rate and cost of essential items in Egypt due to the heightened demand. Therefore, it is deemed more feasible and cost-effective to dispatch emergency relief aid from Malaysia to Gaza. The strong diplomatic ties and collaborative efforts between Malaysia and Egypt enable us to ensure the swift and efficient delivery of aid to Gaza within a few days upon arrival at El-Arish International Airport, Egypt. This strategic approach not only optimizes the allocation of resources but also underscores the commitment of the international community to addressing the urgent needs of the Palestinian people in Gaza, fostering solidarity and support during times of crisis.

Sustainable Project 2: Waqf Medical Centre Umm Al-Khair

Project Justification:

In the West Bank, there are a total of 8 districts, namely Jenin, Jordan Valley, Nablus, Tulkarm, Ramallah, Maccabim, Bethlehem, and Hebron. Within the West Bank, the Israeli authorities maintain numerous checkpoints at district borders, categorized as Fixed Checkpoints and Mobile Checkpoints. Moreover, vehicles intending to cross these checkpoints are required to obtain distinct permits for each district. This frequent need for permit changes forces patients to switch vehicles whenever they cross into a different district route to the hospital. Consequently, it is these restrictions that pose significant barriers to Umm Al Khair residents' access to hospitals and timely medical care. A journey that should ideally take just one hour often extends to 4-5 hours due to the presence of checkpoints and the need to change vehicles





As a result, the planned medical center in Umm Al Khair, located within this district, will immensely benefit approximately 20,000 residents from seven nearby villages, ensuring they receive high-quality and prompt healthcare, particularly during emergencies. The nearest public hospital is Alia Hospital for Palestinians, while the closest private hospital is Al-Ahli Hospital for Palestinians. This medical center will offer specialized women's health services, facilitating mothers in receiving essential care, especially during childbirth, given that many situations prevent them from reaching a hospital in a timely manner, often resulting in home or vehicle deliveries. Additionally, this medical center will be equipped with a pharmacy, emergency care facilities, radiology services, and a medical laboratory, guaranteeing swift and efficient healthcare services for Palestinian residents in the vicinity dealing with health-related issues.



This project is scheduled for implementation over a 8-months period, starting from June, 2024, to Jan, 2025, with a total budget of USD 551,516. The project encompasses excavation for the foundation and water well, preparation of steel reinforcements, supply and casting of plain concrete for the basement floor, and reinforced concrete for the basement and ground floor. It also includes the construction of reinforced concrete walls, the installation of staircases and an elevator roof. Furthermore, the project covers tiling, painting, curtain installation, and the provision and installation of essential medical devices and equipment in the medical center. Medical Centre is deemed essential for this endeavor.

Sustainable Project 3: Hot Meals & Iftar Project

Project Justification:

The daily hot meals distribution and iftar distribution project during Ramadhan in Gaza serves as a vital lifeline for the local population, particularly in light of the ongoing challenges and hardships faced by the region. Initiated in early October and slated for continuous support, this project addresses the urgent need for sustenance and vulnerable nourishment among the communities in Gaza. The Gaza Strip is caught in a relentless cycle of conflict, leading to widespread malnutrition, diseases, and dire living conditions. With over 1.1 million children at risk, the provision of daily hot meals becomes imperative to mitigate the impact of food insecurity and ensure the well-being of the population.



Moreover, the scarcity of clean water resources and fuel exacerbates the situation. hindering the ability of individuals to cook for themselves and their families. In collaboration with our implementing partners, we have established a central kitchen dedicated to daily meal preparation. This strategic approach enables us to efficiently cater to the nutritional needs of the population while ensuring the equitable distribution of meals to those in need. Furthermore, the meals are provided not only to residents but also to patients, medical professionals, and support staff in the nearest hospitals, particularly in southern Gaza, where access to nutritious food is limited. By sustaining the daily hot meals distribution and iftar distribution, we not only alleviate immediate hunger but also contribute to the overall health and well-being of the community. This project exemplifies our commitment to supporting vulnerable populations in Gaza and underscores the importance of collaborative efforts in addressing the multifaceted challenges facing the region.



Through sustained intervention, we aim to break the cycle of deprivation and promote resilience among the people of Gaza. In addition to the critical need for daily hot meals distribution and iftar distribution in Gaza, it is essential to highlight the financial implications of sustaining this project. With an estimated 5,000 people requiring support on a daily basis, the operational costs amount to approximately \$15,000 per day.

To ensure uninterrupted provision of hot meals throughout the month, a budget of approximately \$450,000 is necessary. This funding covers various expenses, including procurement of ingredients, operational costs for the central kitchen, transportation, and personnel expenses.



By acknowledging the financial aspect of this project, we underscore the importance of sustained funding and support from our stakeholders. Securing adequate resources is crucial to maintaining the continuity and effectiveness of the hot meals' distribution initiative, thereby safeguarding the well-being of thousands of individuals in Gaza who rely on this essential lifeline. Through transparent budgeting and efficient resource allocation, we aim to maximize the impact of every dollar invested in this humanitarian endeavor, ensuring that those in need receive timely and nutritious meals on a daily basis.

Project Justification:

Furthermore, it's important to address the specific needs of children in Gaza and the West Bank, who are among the most vulnerable populations affected by the ongoing humanitarian crisis. The "Support for Orphans and Children in Gaza and the West Bank for 2023/2024" is a response to the urgent need to address the challenges faced by children in Gaza and the West Bank especially the orphans. The project's primary goal is to relieve the burdens faced by these children and their caregivers, with a specific focus on providing comprehensive support throughout the academic year, school breaks, and during significant occasions like the holy month of Ramadan and the winter season. The Gaza and West Bank regions have been marked by longstanding conflicts and political instability, resulting in significant socio-economic challenges for the local

population. Among the most vulnerable individuals in these areas are orphaned children who have lost one or both parents, leaving them in precarious situations. These orphans often struggle to access basic necessities and education due to financial constraints. The project also acknowledges the challenges faced during holiday seasons, including Ramadan and winter, which can be especially difficult for orphans and their caregivers. During these times, the financial strain on orphaned families intensifies, and the need for assistance becomes even more critical.



The cost of approximately **\$840 per** child is required to provide support for 12 months to ensure their well-being and access to essential services. In previous years, from 2021 to 2022, MyFundAction successfully supported 223 Palestinian orphans from the West Bank and Gaza. This time, we are committed to expanding our support and aim to assist approximately 1,800 Palestinian children in the years 2023-2024.





This funding covers various aspects, including nutrition, education, healthcare, and psychosocial support, tailored to address the unique challenges faced by children in conflict-affected areas. By incorporating this cost into our project justification, we emphasize the importance of prioritizing the needs of children and investing in their future. Providing comprehensive support to children not only addresses immediate concerns but also fosters long-term resilience and development, paving the way for a brighter and more stable future for the next generation in Gaza and the West Bank. Through targeted interventions and sustained investment, we can make a meaningful difference in the lives of children affected by conflict, empowering them to overcome adversity and thrive despite the challenges they face.
